The Church is rightly proud of its nationwide network of schools, making an authentic and holistic vision of Catholic education a reality, welcoming all, often in the most difficult circumstances. This has a huge impact on the well-being of our country and is a vital service to the Common Good of our nation, a nation characterised by its inclusivity and diversity.

It is therefore important to pay tribute to the many teachers, leaders, support staff and governors, without whose dedicated commitment Catholic schools would not be the nurturing and thriving places so many children benefit from.

We hope that these resources will help you plan your Education Sunday as a celebration of the commitment and achievements of Catholic Education. Homily

- The theme of Education Sunday is 'All are welcome'. There are good connections to be made with the Gospel which is all about mercy: nothing can keep us from the love of God, so all are welcome to his feast. Catholic schools are also places of mercy and welcome.
- In this week's gospel, Jesus tells the Pharisees the parables of the Lost Coin, the Lost Sheep and the Lost Son. The underlying message in all of these parables is that God's mercy and love for us knows no bounds. Just as the Good Shepherd will not give up on the last sheep, so too must all schools nurture all their students, whatever their gifts and talents.
- Also, schools can be the place where God's mercy is often first encountered - especially for those who have wandered far from the faith. A good Catholic school can be a place of encounter with the faith that draws the pupil - and through them the whole family - back into a loving relationship with Christ through the Church.

For all those working in schools at the start of this academic year: may they be an example of Christ's love and create a welcoming home for all students, especially anyone joining the school this year.
