(10, 29-37)

But the man was anxious to justify himself and said to Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?' In answer Jesus said, 'A man was once on his way down from Jerusalem to Jericho and fell into the hands of bandits; they stripped him, beat him and then made off, leaving him half dead.

Now a priest happened to be travelling down the same road, but when he saw the man, he passed by on the other side. In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came on him was moved with compassion when he saw him. He went up to him and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them. He then lifted him onto his own mount and took him to an inn and looked after him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper and said, "Look after him, and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Which of these three, do you think, proved himself a neighbour to the man who fell into the bandits' hands?' He replied, 'The one who showed pity towards him. Jesus said to him, 'Go, and do the same yourself.'


Guide

The Parable of the Good Samaritan 10th Illustration, Codex Purpureus Rossanensis (6th Century) Diocesan Museum and Codex Corigliano-Rossano (CS)

The scene is taken from Luke's Gospel, but with some variants. In the foreground there is Christ helping a wounded man. Christ is assisted by an angel who is giving him a golden cup with oil and wine to dress the wounds. The scene carries a deep symbolic meaning. The Samaritan symbolizes Christ himself who saves fallen Mankind wounded by sin and who leads to the Church, always ready to provide welcome.
