

## World Day of the Poor 2021 Collective Worship for Schools Teachers' Notes

SLIDE 1: Title. The gathering, according to the custom of the school, or class. Appropriate music, or an opening hymn.

SLIDE 2: from Message from Pope Francis for WDOTP 2021, full message on CSAN website at <a href="https://www.csan.org.uk/worlddayofthepoor/">https://www.csan.org.uk/worlddayofthepoor/</a>

SLIDE 3: Opening Prayer – read by worship leader, or by pupils.

SLIDE 4: Some BIG questions. Depending on the size of the gathering, these could be opened up for discussion in the collective worship or in smaller groups afterwards. An important point to bring out is that there are may different forms of poverty, not just material deprivation. Poverty is whenever human life is not flourishing. This could be because of isolation and loneliness, being far from home when you don't want to be, being bullied or dominated by somebody else. SLIDE 5: Gospel Reading – always good to have pupils reading the gospel, to have it signed if possible, and to have it dramatized.

SLIDE 6: Gospel Reading continued.

SLIDE 7-14: Reflection. See: CSAN PDF Resource (website link above) Novena Day 3 Commentary. Also develop idea of contrast between the scribes and the widow. THEY devour widows' houses. SHE gave everything she had. Where do you think the sympathy and blessing of Jesus lies?
